

Ways to Get Involved at Emmanuel

The following tasks are all shared with members of our congregation. They are not difficult or time consuming tasks but rather a lovely way to get more involved in our church. No previous experience is required. For each different task a member of the church is a point person to contact with questions.

Worship

Come to church regularly

The first act of the congregation is to congregate; the most fundamental way to get involved at Emmanuel is to worship with us regularly.

Each Sunday, we hold two services: the first is a shorter, simpler Eucharist upstairs in the Grand Salle at 8:30 am. The second is the traditional Eucharist with music, hymns, and a full sermon at 10:30 am.

Service Helpers

Altar Guild

The Altar Guild makes sure the Eucharist table is set before each service. We ensure that the proper liturgical linens are in place, the wine and bread are set up appropriately, and that the flowers are arranged behind the altar. After the service, we make sure that dirty linens are laundered, that the dishes are washed, and that everything is put back in its proper place.

Choir

The Emmanuel Choir is an integral part of our weekly worship. In addition to leading the congregation in hymns, we perform offertory pieces ranging from

African Singing Group

The African Singing Group is a regular part of the worship life of Emmanuel, regularly offering musical gifts during the offertory. We sing in a variety of languages and styles from all over Africa - often from Ghana and Uganda. We rehearse on Tuesdays from 19:00 to 20:00 and arrive at 9:30 to prepare on those Sunday mornings that we perform. Usher

Ushers at Emmanuel make sure that the logistics of a Sunday morning flow smoothly. We rope off several pews at the rear for latecomers, we greet parishioners and visitors as they enter and make sure that they have the Service Bulletin. We ring the bell as the prelude finishes (unless a choir member does it). We sit in the back of the church to greet and seat latecomers. During the service: we bring forward to the officiant the Eucharist host and wine, then pass the offering plates and then bring them to the officiant at the altar steps; we invite the congregation forward pew-by-pew to receive the Eucharist; and, after the service ends, we straighten the kneelers, collect papers left in the pews, and organize paper recycling. **For questions, contact Peter Cloutier - peter.cloutier@emmanuelchurch.ch**

Lector/Reader

Lectors read the lessons from scripture aloud to the congregation during the 10:30 AM Sunday service. The readings, typically one passage from the Old

Testament and one passage from the New Testament, are assigned based on the Lectionary. No previous experience is necessary. Eucharistic Minister

accompany the kids downstairs to the Sunday School room where we play, read, and do activities together.

Flower Guild

The Flower Guild ensures that the beautiful altar flowers continue to give pleasure in the coming week. After the Sunday service, they are divided into three or four smaller bunches. These are given to the donor (see above), to those celebrating a birthday or anniversary and finally, if any are left, to a parishioner who has made a particular contribution that week. The two vases are emptied ready, for pick up by the florists, and the table is cleaned. Community Life

Coffee Hour

Fellowship is an essential part of the life of Emmanuel, and we join together for coffee each week after the Sunday service. Depending on the season and the weather, this either occurs outside in the garden or upstairs in the Grande Salle. Volunteers for Coffee Hour make this possible. We prepare the coffee, tea, and snacks, and set out cups, napkins, cream & sugar, etc. This happens before the service at 10:00am. Breaking Bread Participant

Approximately monthly, we expand our after-service fellowship to include luncheon. Study Courses offered by Church Divinity School of the Pacific

The Center for Anglican Learning and Leadership (CALL) at the Church Divinity School of the Pacific offers online learning opportunities in three

sessions over the year. Topics range from Biblical studies to congregational leadership, from church history to contemporary theology. Each class is designed for you to participate at your own pace and on your own time. Each week has reading and writing assignments which are shared with the rest of the class. In this way, students share their understanding resulting in expanding your insights. You can take one, or many courses over time. These courses are for anyone interested in any of the subjects or for those seeking licensed lay or ordained ministry. We qualify for discounted tuition through the Convocation. Education for Ministry (EfM)

Education for Ministry (EfM) is a four-year program in practical theology for lay people which explores a wide concept of ministry, based on the baptismal call to minister to each other in our daily lives. Participants register for a year at a time. Over the four years, students study the Hebrew Bible, New Testament, history of Christianity and modern Christian Theology. Discussion focuses on the readings and on “Theological Reflection”, perhaps the most significant part of the course, examining the life around us, big issues and small, through a theological lens alongside our life experience, the culture/society around us, our beliefs and values and Christian tradition. As the study continues, a strong fellowship develops amongst the participants, and they all become more aware of the impact of their faith on their lives. The Convocation typically has a European-wide cohort, which begins during the Spring and meetings are held on Zoom. Refugee Welcome Center

The Emmanuel Welcome Center is a new initiative that seeks to provide practical help to refugees and migrants in the Greater Geneva area. Under the Director, Christine Agharzarm, the work includes the provision of French tuition classes at A1 and A2 levels; one-to-one French conversations with volunteers; a weekly Coffee Hour on Wednesdays; close links with the Rigot Center for two parties a year - one at Christmas and another in spring. In addition, there are two English-immersion weeklong camps for refugee children. Jardin de Montbrillant is a monthly Outreach project in Geneva where we reach out directly to those in need, and supply a cooked meal to 200 - 250 people once per month on a Saturday, year around. The Center, named Jardin de Montbrillant, is run by a local charitable organization located behind the central train station. Our participation allows us to plan a special meal with a team of approximately 10 people, members and friends of the church, who are willing to spend a Saturday morning preparing and serving the less fortunate and offering a welcoming meal and smile. Team leaders organize the shopping for ingredients, and a willing group assists in meal preparation and service. Leadership

Vestry

The Vestry, working with the rector and deacon, is the governing body of our church. The basic responsibilities of the Vestry are to help define and articulate the mission of the congregation; to support the church's mission by word and deed; to select the rector; to ensure effective organization and planning; and to manage resources and finances. This is an elected position, generally for a three-year term. The 9 to 12 Vestry members meet monthly and are asked to serve either as one of the officers or as a liaison to one of the many commissions of our parish. Becoming a member of Vestry is a rewarding responsibility, though clearly one not to take lightly. As in any group of humans, skills of supportive and loving listening, negotiation and resolving conflict can all be part of this critical role in our parish. We are grateful to all

Delegate to Convocation Convention
